I'm really glad all of you were able to participate in yesterday's meeting on the Medford permit, and hopefully that filled in some knowledge gaps for you as to how water quality trading might work under this regional approach. Please send me any additional questions you had that you didn't get to ask or weren't sure of the answer and want to try again, and I'll pass them on to the Willamette Partnership to help get an answer, or to flag them to work into future discussions.

What comes next is the first of the two-day workshops Willamette Partnership is organizing to start tackling the topics that need to be fleshed out to develop the regional trading framework. The agenda for the two-day meeting at Alderbrook on April 9-10 is attached, as well as some preliminary documents we will be discussing. These documents are at a high enough level that you should read through them as an outline, with categories of topics that they will flesh out in with information from the discussions and decisions we make at the meeting. Look to see if any key topics are missing, and it's OK to focus on the part of a trading program you are most concerned about and/or familiar with. It's probably best if I consolidate all of the comments into one response from EPA, so send them to me by COB Thursday. If you don't have time, don't worry – this is not the only time we will be reviewing this set of topics, and I will also be providing comments. Also, there will be more documents to look at right before the April 9-10 meeting, so make sure you have time for those.
